# Henry Lee Shattuck

The Research Bureau's Public Service Awards are named in honor of Henry Lee Shattuck, Chairman of the Research Bureau for 17 years, from 1942 to 1958 and a guiding force behind the establishment of the Research Bureau in 1932. Mr. Shattuck was a lawyer, businessman, State Legislator and City Councillor. He personified integrity, exceptional initiative, outstanding leadership, and sincere commitment to public service. These are the characteristics which are represented by each recipient of the Henry L. Shattuck Public Service Award.

Henry Lee Shattuck was born in Boston on October 12, 1879. As a young man, he attended Harvard College, completing his undergraduate studies in 1901. In 1904, he received his degree from Harvard Law School. After admission to the Massachusetts Bar, he joined Ropes Gray and Gorham, a prestigious Boston law firm, where he gradually became a specialist in corporate and municipal finances and in the management of property as an agent and trustee.

A meticulous lawyer and shrewd and careful manager of money, Mr. Shattuck was a strong advocate of fiscal integrity in government, insisting that an elected official's first duty was to protect the people's money. Following the family tradition of industry, service, and stewardship, Henry Shattuck put his legal and business skills to work in state and city government where his integrity and reliability made him a strong moral force.

In 1908, Mr. Shattuck was elected to the Republican Ward Committee, a role he maintained for almost sixty years. He was elected to the Massachusetts House of Representatives in 1919 and became a member of the House Committee of Ways and Means from 1920 through 1930, six years of which he served as the committee chairman.

Henry Shattuck decided not to run for reelection to a seventh straight term in 1930 in order to concentrate on his newly elected position as Treasurer of Harvard. In 1934, he returned to public life as a Boston City Councillor. He served four successive two-year terms on the Council, enjoying his role as financial watchdog of that body. Mr. Shattuck's respect and influence grew and in 1942 he was once again elected to the House of Representatives, where he served on the Committee of Public Service from 1943 to 1948.

In 1948, at the age of sixty-nine, upon completing a quarter century of distinguished service to the State Legislature and the Boston City Council, Henry Shattuck decided the time had come to relinquish his career as an elected official. He was never again a candidate for public office. At the time, the political editor for the Boston Traveler, Cornelius Dalton, voiced the thoughts of an appreciative electorate when he called him, "one of the truly great legislators of this century on Beacon Hill. He had intellect, integrity and an intense devotion to public service and was absolutely fearless." No Boston political figure in the 20th century was held in higher bipartisan esteem than Henry Shattuck.

Even as a private citizen, Henry Shattuck remained involved in public affairs and issues until his death in 1971 at the age of ninety-one. Because of his interest and support, many young candidates founded careers in public office, enriching the fabric of local government beyond his own lifetime. Henry L. Shattuck had truly proven that one person of conviction can make a difference.

She is known to design rigorous and engaging lessons that meet the needs of a diverse group of learners.

This year, Jane joined the Instructional Leadership Team at Mary Lyon High School, bringing a wealth of knowledge to the team as a long-term educator and specifically as a reading specialist.

Not only has she been an incredible educator, but she has also been a sports coach and mentor to many young girls. As Director of Human Resources in the Planning Department, Mike is skilled at handling tense and emotional situations, and he never shies away from his commitment to transparency.

As leader of the recent Boston Planning & Development Agency compensation study, Mike demonstrated respect for the seriousness of this difficult task. This painstaking project required examination of every individual’s job description. Mike worked to make staff feel heard, valued, and a part of the process.

Under Mike’s leadership as Director of HR Services at the City of Boston during the COVID crisis, staff witnessed his strong work ethic and adaptability in guiding central OHR through the uncertainty as the pandemic evolved. ### **ROBERT LIMARDO**

Deputy Superintendent of Field Operations  
Boston Water & Sewer Commission

From simple drainage issues to major water main breaks, Robert Limardo has been getting his feet wet for the Boston Water and Sewer Commission since 1988.

Now serving as Deputy Superintendent of Field Operations, Robert oversees both day and night operations. His broad knowledge of the Commission’s infrastructure makes him an asset for training and ensuring immediate responses to customer concerns.

Robert has shown dedication to solving the major flooding issues on Circuit Drive in Franklin Park. When heavy rainstorms flood Circuit Drive, the road is shut down, causing buses, emergency vehicles, and ambulances en route to Longwood hospitals to be rerouted. Robert works in knee-deep waters to ensure drainage issues are fixed and the roads are passable.

Robert started as a Special Heavy Motor Equipment Operator. He then worked as Supervisor, where he oversaw all aspects of sewer and water maintenance and was also in charge of training new employees to operate heavy equipment. Then for 13 years, he worked as the Operations Manager, where he oversaw all night operations for water and sewer maintenance, but also performed personnel reviews, issued discipline, and oversaw training of supervisors among other things.

He has come to be known as a dedicated employee who exemplifies the commitment of outstanding public service.

### **GARY MARINO**

Police Officer  
Boston Police Department

Officer Gary Marino joined the Boston Police Department as a cadet in 1995 and served in that role until being appointed a recruit officer in 1998. Upon graduation, he was assigned to East Boston, where in 2011, he was made District A-7's Community Service Officer based on his community policing philosophy and excellent record.

In 2019, Gary founded and has been the driving force behind a unique program to connect the youth of East Boston and other neighborhoods through hockey: the A-7 Boston Police Department Youth Hockey Skills Program. Gary also designed a dry land program for the offseason to keep the players active and maintain the connections they've built.

The greatest barrier to entry for young hockey players is the cost of equipment. In partnership with the Department of Conservation & Recreation hockey rink in East Boston, other police officers who are hockey players, and friends and family in the East Boston community, Gary provided all the necessary equipment for the youth of East Boston to play. The hockey program allows East Boston youth to learn and develop in a game that many of them never thought they would have a chance to participate in.

The hockey program recently went beyond East Boston, opening free city-wide ice hockey skill training.

### **BRIAN MCLAUGHLIN**

Senior Project Controls Manager  
Public Facilities Department

Brian McLaughlin works as the Senior Program Manager for the Public Facilities Department, which manages the planning, design, construction, and major renovation of all City-owned buildings in Boston. Brian joined the Department in 2014 as an Assistant Director with a focus on school buildings, having previously worked at the Massachusetts School Building Authority. He saw missed opportunities for taking full advantage of the MSBA's grant funding. Over the last ten years, Brian has increased applications and the reimbursement rate considerably.

The City went from submitting three Core applications for large scale capital projects in 2008, to now, since 2014, submitting five applications for Core projects and thirty-five applications for small projects, totaling over \$200 million in reimbursements. Brian has successfully led the application process, and his deep commitment is reflected in how he executes each project.

Since 2016, Brian has led the Department for a day of service at The Carter School, a school that serves the most severely challenged children in the City. Brian developed a strong relationship with the school during the MSBA application process and has been a steadfast proponent for the students, staff and families. Brian, along with the Parks and Public Works departments, arranged to perform an extensive landscaping day to transform the school's sensory garden. It was in large part due to Brian's leadership, advocacy and passion that the Carter School received acceptance into the MSBA Core program. And a new state-of-the-art, fully accessible building is under construction and is scheduled to open in September 2025.

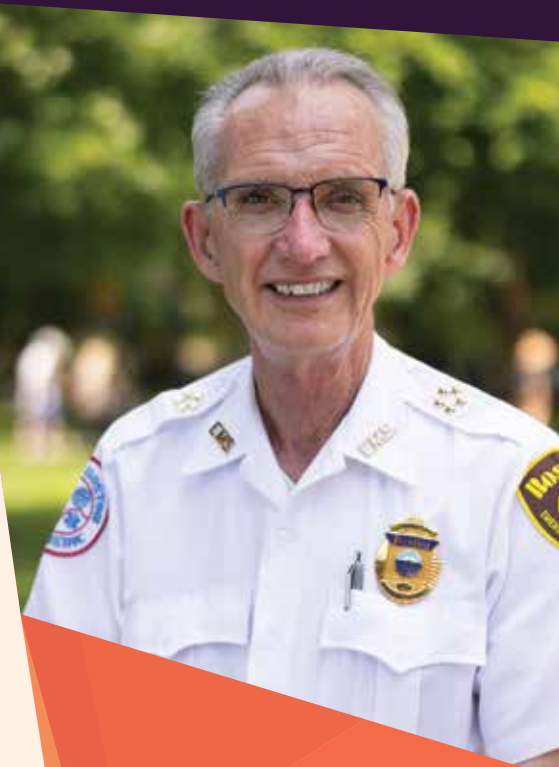

Chief James Hooley began working at Boston EMS as an EMT 46 years ago. Since then, he has dedicated his life to the wellbeing of our Boston community. From EMT, to Paramedic, to Deputy Superintendent, to Superintendent of Operations, to Superintendent in Chief, and finally to Chief of the Department, Chief Hooley has put heart and professionalism into his service to the public.

Through Chief Hooley's leadership, Boston EMS has made strides in providing better care to Boston's residents and growing our EMS workforce. Over the past two years, Boston EMS has taken an innovative approach to addressing behavioral health needs through Mobile Integrated Healthcare (MIH) programs. This year, Boston EMS started its first Cadet program in decades; and within the last year EMS has hired more than 90 members to join the now 428 uniformed personnel. Chief Hooley understands that making lasting and meaningful change takes time, but through constant dedication to these causes, he and his team have been able to make immense progress.

Chief Hooley knows that to fulfill Boston EMS' mission, he must first support personnel, and he has fought hard for his staff to have competitive salaries, to increase the workforce and prevent burnout, and to ensure that mental and behavioral health services are available to all EMS personnel. He is a compassionate public servant above all else and a humble leader.

# *City Champion Award*

What is a Champion? In keeping with the strictest definition of the word, a “champion” is an advocate or defender, one who does battle for another’s rights or honor, a person who shows marked superiority.

In 1998, the Research Bureau established the Shattuck City Champion Award to honor a business leader and a nonprofit leader for their significant contributions to the Boston civic community. Since 1998, 51 private sector leaders have been recognized as Shattuck City Champions and two more leaders will be honored tonight.

Because Boston is a city rich in leadership and commitment from the business and nonprofit sectors, the Research Bureau formally recognizes the contributions to the public good by our colleagues in the private sector. In keeping with the spirit of the Henry L. Shattuck Public Service Awards, we honor good works and accomplishments, including those that have escaped broad public notice.

The two individuals who will be honored tonight as Shattuck City Champions not only meet the definition of a champion, they also typify the spirit and substance of the award.



## *City Champion Award*

### **PAMELA D. EVERHART**

Senior Vice President, Head of Regional  
Public Affairs, Inclusion and Impact  
Fidelity

Pamela Everhart has spent 30 years at Fidelity Investments, where she now oversees the firm's state and local government relationships, is responsible for the Global D&I strategy, and community relations and corporate affairs activities in Boston, nationally, and abroad. She also leads Fidelity's "Invest in My Education (ME)" initiative: a \$250M program to help students from underserved communities and underrepresented populations graduate from college with little to no educational debt. The program also provides mentoring as well as other ongoing support, as well as help finding post-graduation employment, starting students on a pathway to generational wealth.

Prior to joining Fidelity, Pamela was an associate with Ropes & Gray LLP and practiced as a CPA and senior tax manager with EY. Pamela received a bachelor's degree from the University of Texas at Austin and a Juris Doctorate from Harvard Law School. She is admitted to practice law in Massachusetts and before the Supreme Court. As a community leader, Pamela is active in several community service organizations and sits on several not-for-profit boards. She is one of the nineteen Massachusetts Black and Brown executives who launched the New Commonwealth Racial Equity and Social Justice Fund to help drive transformative social change to address systemic racism and racial inequity. Pamela was also recently appointed to serve on Governor Healey's Advisory Council on Black Empowerment to advise on issues related to the economic prosperity and wellbeing of Massachusetts' Black community and was recognized by "Boston Magazine" as one of the 150 most influential Bostonians of 2024.

Michael Curry was named one of the Boston Business Journal's Power 50 Movement Makers (2022, 2023), one of Boston's Most Influential Men of Color by GetKonnected!, one of Boston Magazine's 150 Most Influential Bostonians (2023, 2024), and a Bostonian of the Year in 2021 (along with his member health centers) by The Boston Globe and Boston Magazine.

Michael has held offices and board seats in the NAACP at both the local and national level for over a decade. He is also an Adjunct Professor at both New England Law and Suffolk University's Moakley Center and Sawyer School of Management. In 2022, Michael co-founded the Health Equity Compact in Massachusetts, a collective centering racial justice and health equity.

Michael earned a Bachelor of Arts from Macalester College in St. Paul, Minnesota, a Doctor of Jurisprudence from New England School of Law, a Doctorate in Business Administration from Curry College, and one in Healthcare Administration from Labouré College.

He also serves on numerous boards and committees, including: Embrace Boston; Eastern Bank's Board of Advisors; public broadcasting GBH's Board of Advisors; Alliance for Business Leadership (ABL); the National NAACP Board of Directors; Harvard & Legacy of Slavery Initiative's External Advisory Committee; Harvard School of Public Health's Community Coalition for Equity in Research (co-Chair); Massachusetts Coalition for Serious Illness Care (MCSIC); New England Council Board of Directors; Federal Reserve Bank of Boston's Community Development Advisory Council (CDAC); Health Policy Commission's Advisory Board; RIZE Massachusetts (aimed at ending the overdose crisis); and the Health Equity Compact (HEC).

He is a frequent political commentator on WBUR's Radio Boston, Morning Edition, and Week in Review; Boston Public Radio WGBH with Jim Braude and Margery Eagan, WGBH's Greater Boston, and New England Cable News.
